	 Be a great reading partner! It's no fun to read when you're forced to or feel embarrassed to read. Building trust and supporting a child rea der is crucial as a reading partner. Here are some tips for becoming a great reading partner: Be patient and encouraging. Read aloud and track the words with your finger as you are reading. Read the same stories over and over. Try reading the same stories in different ways, with different voi ces to make it fun and interesting. Ask questions about the story while you're reading. Discuss what you see in the pictures. Pick books that are at the right level for your young reader—5+ mistakes on one page is too hard. Gently correct mistakes and re-read the entire sentence. Give positive feedback and tell the reader he or she is doing a great job. Build reading into your child's daily routine – read at least 5 x per week. 			
Reception	Reception have been busy this week introducing our project this half term; Winter Wonderland. We have enjoyed exploring real ice and finding out about different places around the world that are cold.			
Year 1	This week Year 1 have started their new DT project 'Taxi'. We had a look at different toys and how they moved. We have learned some new vocabulary: axis, chassis and wheels and have started to identify these on some of the toys.			
Year 2	Yr 2 went on materials walk around school and made a pic collage of the ones we saw.			
Year 3	In Year 3 this week we began our new book in English writing – Journey, by Aaron Becker. Journey is a picture book which means it is a brilliant text to use for our writing as we have a blank page to start with. In our first lesson, we looked at some of the pictures from the book, tried to decide what was happening and, as a challenge, we attempted to order the pictures to tell the story.

HOME VISITS	 Day 1 Home Visit: If a child is absent from school and we do not receive any communication from the family explaining the reason for the absence, a member of our staff will conduct a home visit on the first day of the unexplained absence. This is to confirm the child's safety and to offer any necessary support to the family. Day 3 Home Visit: For all absences, even those with an initial reason provided, we will conduct a home visit on the third consecutive day of absence. This is to ensure continued support and to check on the child's well-being. These home visits are in line with recommended good safeguarding practices and are consistent with policies followed by other local schools. Our goal is to ensure every child's safety and to maintain clear communication with families. Thank you for your cooperation in helping us keep our school community safe.
